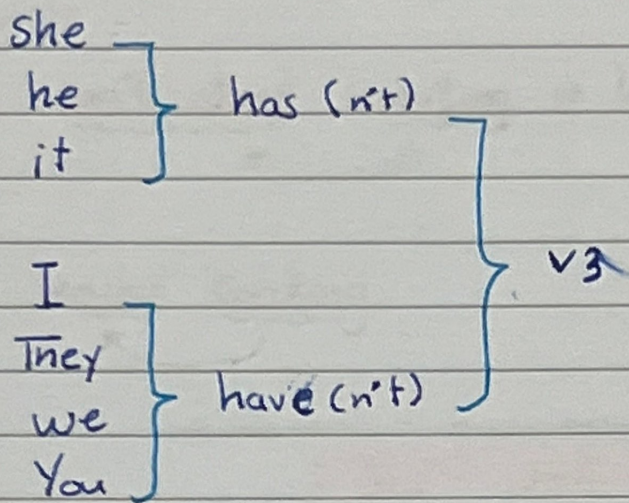


present Perfect

 between the auxiliary verb (has / have) and past perfect.

Yet → asks whether something expected has happened

the end of:

use → negative sentence

I have n't finished my hw yet.

question

Have you finished your hw yet?

Already → S-th happened before we expected it to

= between have-has
 and Past Perfect

= at the end of the clause.

Ali has already repaired his car.

Have you already washed the dishes?
